DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SERVICES

The Address Confidentiality Program was established to "protect the confidentiality of the address of a relocated victim of domestic violence, sexual offense, stalking, or human trafficking to prevent the victim's assailants or potential assailants from finding the victim through public records." REQUIREMENTS FOR APPLICANT FOR TEMPORARY CONCEALED HANDGUN PERMIT

"Upon presentment to the sheriff of [an application, a permit fee, and a full set of fingerprints, as required under G.S. 14-415.13(a)(1), (a)(2), and (a)(3), respectively], the sheriff may issue a temporary permit for a period not to exceed 45 days to a person who the sheriff reasonably believes is in an emergency situation that may constitute a risk of safety to the person, the person's family or property. The applicant may submit proof of a protective order issued under G.S. 50B-3 for the protection of the applicant as evidence of an emergency situation. The temporary permit may not be renewed and may be revoked by the sheriff without a hearing." G.S. 14-415.15(b).

The sheriff is authorized to issue a temporary permit when the sheriff believes that the applicant is in an emergency situation and the applicant presents all of the following:

- 1. An application, completed under oath, on a form provided by the sheriff.
- 2. A nonrefundable permit fee.
- 3. A full set of fingerprints of the applicant administered by the sheriff.
