In 2022, the Equal Access to Justice Commission continued to assess civil legal needs and explore projects and policies to address the justice gap. Our dedicated and talented staff pursued access to justice for all North Carolinians by engaging new and existing partners in our pro bono legal service projects, self-represented litigant resources, and advocacy for civil legal aid.

The Commission continues to serve as a convener for collaboration and assessment to further its mission to empower North Carolinians to meet their legal needs. This impact report shares the specifics of our innovative and effective work and opportunities for you to connect with it.

The Commission's Pro Bono Resource Center tracked over **60,000 pro bono hours** reported by North Carolina attorneys in 2022. **Join us in the pursuit of equal access to justice.**





HIGHLIGHTS

NC Legal Services Conference

The Commission partnered with the NC Equal Justice Alliance to support the legal aid community's biennial NC Legal Services Conference. Held virtually over four days, the Conference provided its 400 registrants up to 12 hours of CLE credit in 39 different programs presented by 74 different speakers from within and outside the North Carolina legal aid community.

Improved NC Guide and File System

In early 2022, the Commission partnered with a national user-testing firm to conduct a groundbreaking eye-tracking study on the North Carolina Guide and File system. The valuable findings of this innovative study have been implemented to make this document generation system even more user-friendly for NC court users.

NC Pro Bono Coordinators' Network




