# Why a Diversion Program for 16-17 year olds in Durham, NC?

- North Carolina is one of only two states in the country that charges 16 year olds for misdemeanor crimes in adult criminal court.
- The impact of an adult criminal arrest or citation is public record and can indelibly harm a teenager's future.



# Durham Statistics for 16-17 year old misdemeanor offenders

- In 2012, 632 misdemeanor charges were taken out on 16 and 17 year olds. Of these, 47 were ordered to supervised probation; 90 were placed on unsupervised probation and 495 charges were dismissed with/out mandated program participation.
- Estimates from Durham LEO and NC Administrative Office of the Courts show between 501-531 young people ages 16-17 would have been eligible for MDP in 2012-2013.
- MDP has opened 120 referrals in Durham County; 2 youth did not complete MDP and we have seen 113 successful completions to date.



# Partners for Misdemeanor Diversion



### Eligibility for MDP

- Any 16 -17 year old first time misdemeanor offender (with the exception of firearms offenses, sex offenses, and traffic matters).
- Law enforcement shall maintain discretion as to who he or she will refer for diversion. It is the philosophy of both Durham Police Department and Office of the Sheriff, that diversion is the preferred outcome where appropriate.



### Referral process for law enforcement

- The officer will give the youth a "post card" and explain its contents with an emphasis on contacting the coordinator within 48 hours of referral.
- Finally, the officer will complete their agency created IR and send the one page MDP referral sheet to MDP Coordinator within 24 hours.
- If an officer opts not to utilize MDP and make an arrest for a misdemeanor allegation, detailed rationale should be in the narrative to support this use of their discretion.

## Intake Screening

- The one page referral form will be sent directly to the Program Coordinator and they will double check for eligibility.
- Youth/Parent will contact Coordinator for intake screening within 48 hours of IR being issued.
- Following intake, youth is given a Diversion Court Date and referred to a community diversion program based on individual needs and reason for referral.



# Consequences of Adult Allegations

All arrest/allegations in the adult legal system can have a lifelong negative impact for a young person, even if the case is diverted.



Direct Consequences– jail, probation,fines, etc.

#### **MDP** Court

- All youth will be required to attend a Diversion Court session, with a
  Judge and prosecutor educating them about consequences of crime
  and taking responsibility for their actions.
- Role play scenario of actual adult criminal court misdemeanor case is completed.
- Direct and collateral consequences of adult criminal involvement is reviewed by Judge and Prosecutor.



### **MDP Programs**

Program examples:

Making A Change – problem solving skills, analyzing thoughts and feelings before acting.

BECOMING Leadership Skills – utilization of strengths, leadership traits, dealing with peer pressure.

Carolina Outreach Independent Living Skills – resume, career assessments, budgeting, renting your first place.

 Additional program options are: Teen Court, Mediation at CRC, Durham TRY (LIFT), P.R.O.U.D., and The Volunteer Center for community service.



#### Additional Services Provided

- Any youth in need of further substance abuse and/or mental health services will be referred to BECOMING/Alliance, Carolina Outreach, or Duke for an evaluation and any recommended treatment.
- Tutoring, mentoring, employment assistance, and extracurricular activities are also available if needed.
- Community resource guides are provided to all families.
- All services provided with MDP are free of charge.




## Final Notifications for Completion

- Upon completion successful completion of MDP program, the coordinator will notify law enforcement, schools, and partnering agencies.
- The youth is then released from MDP and the IR is closed out with youth having no record or adult criminal history.
- If any youth does not comply or compete assigned MDP program, the referring officer will be notified and can opt to move forward in criminal court for prosecution.




