COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES TO DATE

Preliminary Recommendations:

- 1. That the NCCALJ Technology Committee serve as the advisory committee, as directed in Session Law 2015-241, to ensure the development and implementation of a strategic plan for the eCourts information technology initiative of the Judicial Branch.
 - a. That a third party vendor consultant be retained in order to fulfill the requirement by legislation for the development of an eCourts strategic plan pursuant to the charge in Session Law 2015-241, Section 18A.21(a).
- 2. That the Judicial Branch follow industry best practices by establishing a governance model whereby the various stakeholder groups work together in a structured process to prioritize court system IT projects and needs.

TOPICS FOR FURTHER CONSIDERATION

- 1. Explore possible implementation of a comprehensive electronic clerk's office system with an integrated case management component that allows stakeholders to better manage court business.
- Examine opportunities to enhance the ability of the Judicial Branch to provide data that is consistent, interpretable, relevant, and secure.
- 3. Encourage the adoption of a formal information technology governance process to strategically prioritize IT projects in a way that best addresses the business needs of the court system.
 - a. The Technology Committee of the State Judicial Council drafted a governance charter and process that complements the needs of the North Carolina courts and builds upon best practices in IT management.

TOPICS FOR FURTHER CONSIDERATION

- 4. Serve as an advisory committee to the NC Administrative Office of the Courts to ensure the development and implementation of a strategic plan for the eCourts initiative.
 - a. The strategic plan shall:
 - Clearly articulate the requirements for the eCourts system, including well-defined milestones, cost parameters, and performance measures;
 - ii. Prioritize the funding needs for implementation;
 - iii. Identify potential issues that may arise in the development of the system, and plans for mitigating those roadblocks; and
 - iv. Address the potential for incorporating any currently existing resources into the eCourts platform.
